

This slide is from our wear and carry course. Dennis Tueller studied how quickly an attacker with a contact weapon like a knife can close distance on a defender with a holstered handgun. It became known as the Tueller Effect.

The Tueller Effect shows that distance disappears fast. An attacker can cover roughly 21 feet in about the time it may take an average person to recognize the threat, decide what to do, draw from concealment, and fire accurately.

For armed citizens, the lesson is:

Distance buys time. Time buys options. Options may keep you alive and out of court.

The industry recommendation is to maintain a perimeter of 31-50 feet and keep an eye on anyone who enters that perimeter if they look at all suspicious or dangerous. Be prepared to act because your life might depend on it.
